Last month the 97th Engr Bn experienced what many soldiers may have considered beforehand one of the most exhausting events of their Army career (Be it two or 22 years). This event was the AIG or better known to most of us, as the "IG." Once a year this inspection takes place in each unit, and once a year the same fear passes through the ranks. In almost all units around the world the same things happen.

About one month before the IG the commanders begin to think about it. Two weeks before everyone starts running around with their heads in a spin, and they don't stop spinning until the day after the IG. Its rush rush rush, and the whole purpose of an inspection defeated. The Army must know that when the IG

finally takes place that it is only because of working overtime and even nights that the unit appears to be fairly orderly.

But what would have happened if the IG had come unannounced and two weeks early? Where would most sections in the battalion have been...it takes no Rhodes Scholar to figure that they would be sitting around, caught with their pants down? Does that mean we should be proud because in two weeks we finally started doing the job we should have been doing 52 weeks out of the year? Can we honestly pat ourselves on the back, and sit back down and wait for the next one to come around?

Of course maybe most of us won't be around next year for one reason or the other, ETS, PCS or maybe even retire. So why should we care what happens to our jobs and predicament one year from now?

All this sounds rather harsh, and no one expects a unit to run around in high gear as it does during the IG, 365 days a year. But there is no reason for us to shift to low or neutral.

If the equipment is kept clean and the daily maintenance is done; if the records and paperwork is filed instead of thrown around haphazardly; if the buildings are kept fairly clean instead of in shambles; if everyone does an average job at what he is supposed to be doing, instead of shamming for the next 50 weeks, then maybe the IG will not be the monster which comes down from the hill once a year, but just another inspection.
