KNOW YOUR COMMANDING OFFICER

The following background on each Company Commander within the 97th Engr Bn is to familiarize you with your particular Commanding Officer.

<u>HQ COMPANY:</u> 1LT David H Jernigan attended Basic Tng at Ft Benning, GA and completed Basic in Jul 66. He had AIT at Ft Dix, NJ in Jul and Aug and entered Engr Officers Candidate School at Ft Belvoir, VA. 1LT Jernigan graduated from OCS in May 67. 1LT Jernigan has served as Assistant Adjutant, Unit Personnel Technician, Platoon Leader in both C and D Co's and Commo Officer of HHC before becoming CO of HHC in Aug 68.

<u>A COMPANY:</u> 1LT Edmund R McCarthy was commissioned as a ROTC Officer in Jun 67 after graduating from Rennselaer Poly Tech in Troy, NY. After graduating from Engr Officer School, Ft Belvoir, VA, 1LT McCarthy was assigned to the 97th Engr Bn as Equipment Platoon Leader, A Co in Nov 67. In Aug 68, 1LT McCarthy became the Field Maint Platoon Leader of A Co and, in Apr 69, became Commanding Officer, A Co, 97th Engr Bn.

<u>B</u> <u>COMPANY:</u> 1LT David F Kinzer, Jr was commissioned 31 Mar 67 after completing Engr Officer Candidate School at Ft Belvoir, VA. In Apr 67, 1LT Kinzer was assigned to the 97th Engr Bn as Construction Platoon Leader of B Co and in Oct 67 became Earthmoving Platoon Leader. In Feb 68, 1LT Kinzer was assigned as D Co's Operations Officer until Aug 68 when he was assigned as Commanding Officer of B Co.

<u>C COMPANY:</u> 1LT Hubert M Nance, Jr was commissioned through ROTC while attending NC St Univ in Raleigh, NC in Jun 67. After completion of Engr Officers' School at Ft Belvoir, VA, 1LT Nance was assigned to C Co, 97^{th} Engr Bn, in Oct 67 as both the Operations Officer and Construction Officer. In Sep 68, 1LT Nance served as the S-3 Officer until Mar 69, when he was assigned as Commanding Officer, C Co.

D COMPANY: CPT Thomas Е Todd was commissioned after completing Engr Officers Candidate School in Ft Belvoir, VA in 1966. Prior to OCS, CPT Todd completed a 44-week Special Forces School and is qualified as a Sr Parachutist. CPT Todd served at Ft Irwin, CA from Aug 66 to Mar 67 before being assigned to Vietnam. While in Vietnam, CPT Todd served as the Maint Officer in the 507th Engr Detachment, as a Unit Commanding Officer in the 28th Engr Detachment, and as XO in the 82nd Engr Detachment and was promoted to the rank of CPT on 3 Aug 68. In Dec 68, CPT Todd was assigned to the 97th Engr Bn as the Assistant Executive Officer and on 9 Jan 69 was assigned as D Co's Commanding Officer.

PROMOTION TO CAPTAIN

Construction of some 27 prefabricated storage shelters on Custer Hill began 20 May 69 and is expected to be completed by 15 Aug.

2LT Thomas G Trivan's platoon and 2LT Robert L Barna's platoon of C Co have been working overtime in order to meet the completion date. Most of these shelters measure 24', 3", by 15', 3".

CORRECTIONAL TRAINING FACILITY

D Co has initiated projects for CTF (Correctional Tng Facility) in their bivouac area. 2LT Reid's earthmoving platoon began construction Sat, 7 Jun, and worked continuously through Sun and Mon constructing a concrete pad for CTF's Mess area. CTF's bivouac area is located about one mile north of the tank trails (also constructed by the 97th Engr Bn). The 48' x 22' pad will support a 16' x 32' mess tent (G.P. Medium). SSG Jackson, also of D Co, is assisting in the supervision.

1LT Stroble's platoon is also working on this project and is in charge of the construction of 11 squad frames (for living quarters). A drainage ditch is also being built from old Hwy 77, 650 feet west to the bivouac area.

Estimated completion date for this project is 20 Jun 69.
